The Bureau of Meteorology recently upgraded its MetEye page with improved wave and swell maps for mariners. That may or may not interest you, but there's a wealth of detail for both land and sea at www.bom.gov.au/australia/meteye.

Again for the mariners, the complete (apart from Metro Waters) coastal forecasts are at www.bom.gov.au/marine/lite/forecast/sa-coastal-districts.shtml. There are no graphics, so the page loads quickly, ideal for smartphone use when you're sitting on a beach somewhere.

Your geographer colleagues are probably aware of this other new page, a view of the Australian region from the new Japanese meteorological satellite: satview.bom.gov.au. You can now see what's coming in almost real time.

And if you want to watch the entire globe, the Earth Polychromatic Imaging Camera is in a much higher orbit: epic.gsfc.nasa.gov.



One of the problems I've had with this issue has been extracting URLs from Word files. It's all very well having embedded hyperlinks in electronic documents but for print the links have to be spelled out.

Word, being too smart for its own good, hides its hyperlinks so that devious means, and I've discovered two, are needed to find their text. To save me the trouble please always include URLs at text, not Word's hyperlinks. In *Outdoor News* the live links are generated by InDesign and Acrobat but you can still read them..

I would like to make amends for this omission and formally thank Recreation SA for their valuable and much appreciated support and contribution to the night. I hope we can continue to develop links with Rec SA and contribute to the wider Outdoor Community in our state through this association.

As the end of Term 3 drew near it was time to that Year 12 students prepared for and undertook their self reliant journeys and my students had chosen to visit Mt Remarkable National Park for bushwalking and Chowilla for kayaking. It was great to visit Mt Remarkable after some time in absence. The evidence of bushfires and heavy rains over previous years had begun to recede and has helped mask any excessive evidence of overuse which was becoming significant 10 years ago. I must admit the signage and toilet at Kingfisher are welcome additions to what has become a very heavily used area with the park. Venturing out the back of Black Range was a little quieter and Sugar Gum campsite had all but disappeared under the spreading waters of the usually near dry dam. Chowilla was looking grand with a vibrant glow to trees that only I from our group could remember as wilting sticks at the end of the drought. For now the management of these areas is sufficient to mask recent scars but good management seems more evident and more essential as I look at these areas now with the ever growing recreational use of our diverse but over used natural areas.

Our first Outdoor Seminar Series 'The Australian Curriculum—Learning through the Outdoors' was held on Friday 4 September at PAC. This was a great night with over 20 people coming together to hear from Scott Polley on the National Curriculum and Outdoor Education's place in it. There was time for sharing and discussion about how Outdoor Education can be infused within the school curriculum from primary to secondary settings. Thanks to Scott Polley for his work in presenting this seminar.

The GACO (Great Aussie camp Out) was held on Saturday 10 October and it is hoped that many of you got involved and enjoyed camping out in the great outdoors with others and enjoying the wonders of this great outdoor experience. If not then get involved next year and let your students/parents/other teachers know about it as well.



Outdoor Education Week this year is 25–31 October and is another fixture on the calendar. Updated Adventure Activity Standards

Recreation SA is pleased to announce nine newly updated Adventure Activity Standards have been finalised and are now available at www.recreationsa.org/outdoors.

The standards address the minimum acceptable standards of safety, skills and behaviour expected when planning and undertaking outdoor adventure activities.

The AAS have been developed with the goal of assisting organisations, guides and leaders to plan and undertake outdoor adventure activities with dependent participants. This document should be used as a key part of your organisation's risk management program.

Participants undertaking adventure activities may already have a degree of skill and experience in a particular adventure activity, and as such may be less dependent upon the group leader for guidance and instruction. In these situations, the AAS should be adapted to reflect the experience of group members and the particular circumstances surrounding the adventure activity.

Regardless of the extent to which the AAS is adopted, each organisation, guide and leader has a duty of care to its participants to have completed a thorough risk analysis of the activity and should have developed a risk management approach that takes into account potential and unexpected situations.

Vale Cam Roy

A figure well known in climbing, Scouting, university climbing club and outdoor education circles Cameron Roy tragically died on September 27, 2015, aged 28. Cameron was an inspirational Scout Leader in every respect, and a recent awardee of the Baden Powell Scout Award: the highest honour in Scouts. Cameron was always enthusiastic and passionate, as can be seen in this film clip on 'Totally Wild' where he takes a reporter through his beloved Morialta Conservation Park: <www.sa.scouts.com.au/heysen>. Tim Gill, former chair of SAREA and employer of Cam has prepared a short valedictory to this amazing man. Cameron leaves behind many friends, brother Callum and parents Ken and Gwenda Lord.

The Scouting, Outdoor and Climbing community is deeply saddened regarding the tragic loss of Cam Roy in September 2015. Quite clearly, his family will be experiencing the deepest loss at this point, however the size of the hole he has left behind in the broader community is testament to the scope of his impact across many people and networks.

While Cam made immense contributions to the Scouting community I knew Cam from his involvement with the outdoor recreation and climbing instruction

community. Cam completed his Diploma in Outdoor Recreation at TAFESA and having known him at this time it was exciting and humbling to see him go from student to colleague to teacher in such a rapid time frame. He had a fantastic questioning mind that would always seek the best answer, not just any answer and managed to do this in a respectful way.

Cam pro-actively got involved with SAREA for no other reason other than to give back and help another not-for-profit organisation. His work ethic was tireless, his attention to detail was relied upon and at the time of his passing he was a cornerstone member of the SAREA Board and trainee assessor for the Training and Assessment panel.

I was also fortunate enough to work alongside Cam at Outgrow. He was top-notch professional, always sought to develop his skills and was one of those staff members that I never, ever worried about. It was an honour to have him involved over the years.

Cam breathed skiing, climbing, caving and many other pursuits and has introduced hundreds and hundreds of people to these activities safely.

Wherever you are Cam, hope the powder is dry and deep, the rock solid and steep and the caves... well you know I was always afraid of caving Cam so stay out of those! Rest in peace mate, you'll be missed. 

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Paddling news

Paddling goes on all year round, but now that the weather is warming up more people will be thinking of going out on the water. Canoe SA has begun its Sprint regatta season and recently hosted the canoe and kayak events of the Masters Games.

There's Polo going happening on the Patawalonga at Anderson Avenue on Saturday afternoons and a junior training session near the footbridge at Corcoran Drive West Lakes on Sunday mornings. Also on the Pat Holdfast Bay Paddlesports Club has begun a junior development program.

Flatwater Skills, Lifeguard, Guide and Instructor courses will be going on over summer: check the Canoe SA website for details and registration. On Sunday 14 February there will be another assessment day, similar to the one held early this year.

Both Australian Canoeing and Canoe SA will hold their AGMs in November, AC in Sydney Saturday 14, Canoe SA the following Saturday, 21. AC is expected to announce its rebranding and details of its new participation program. Canoe SA will be seeking new members on its board of directors.

Explorers

The following comes from the Explorers brochure:

Explorers is Adelaide Canoe Club's offering for Australian Canoeing's forthcoming participation scheme. It is built around short expeditions on interesting waters and includes skill development to suit the craft being used and discussion of the trip environments. Trips will be limited to eight participants at a time, and bookings will be essential.

Eligibility

To be eligible for Explorers participants must:


- be aged between 10 and 14
- be a current member of a Canoe SA club, or have Canoe SA Introductory membership
- be able to operate independently, and as a member of a group
- have paddling experience, either through a club introductory or holiday program.

Leadership

All trips will be led by at least two leaders. The leader in charge will hold appropriate AC Instructor or Guide qualifications, others may be Community Coaches from other clubs or people training for an Instructor or Guide award seeking to log time under supervision.

Boats and equipment

Adelaide Canoe Club gained an Active Club grant to purchase two Prijon Junior Seayak kayaks and their associated equipment. Canoe SA has purchased two similar craft. A junior Voyager sea kayak has been built and several other kayaks suitable for use by young paddlers are available.



Possible trips

(Only two are listed here)

Trips are planned to last about two hours and, especially for Barker Inlet trips, for days of minimal tidal movement. Forecast weather conditions will determine whether or not a trip goes ahead.

Jock's Creek

Explore one of the creeks off Angas Inlet. Meet mangroves, seabirds, and perhaps dolphins, and search for the remains of the *Kadina*. Learn about channel marks and marine traffic rules.

Launch from Garden Island boat ramp.

Swan Alley

Navigate to Swan Alley Creek using chart and compass. Explore some of the creek, the old embankment and its channel.

Launch from Garden Island boat ramp.

When?

This is a new program so these dates are very tentative. Whether a trip goes ahead as planned, if at all, will depend on the weather forecast for the day. In some areas trips will be timed to suit tides, and mornings will be preferred, to avoid the summer sea breezes.

Some possible dates

November: Saturday 7, Sunday 22

December: Saturday 5, Sunday 6, Saturday 19, Sunday 20

January: Tuesday 5, Tuesday 19 (Days of neap tide) Other trips will fit around holiday programs.

Getting outside in nature to develop skills and boost wellbeing

From DECD Staff Update

Many of us have fond memories of catching tadpoles in the local creek and digging for worms in the garden but for many children nowadays, getting outside is a rarity.

With one in four parents admitting their children have never climbed a tree and the average child spending 4.5 hours of screen time a day, it's important that children are offered opportunities to explore nature in order to promote learning and wellbeing.

The State Government is supporting new initiatives, Nature Play SA and outdoor learning areas in pre-schools, to encourage more children to play and discover outdoors.

DECD's Preschool Outdoor Learning Project

Five department-funded redeveloped outdoor learning areas will be opened next year as part of DECD's Preschool Outdoor Learning Project. A further five sites will be opened each year for the next three years, ultimately providing 20 demonstration sites across South Australia. The project is part of a \$6 million commitment over four years by the government to redevelop nature-based outdoor learning areas in preschools where the design is informed and driven by children, families, the local community and the educators.

Acting Director Early Childhood Services, Helen Doyle said the department supports children and young people to engage in learning through having increased opportunities to experience risk and challenge, which has a lifelong impact in building resilience in children.

"In recent years there has been a cultural shift in our society, with technological advances leading to more sedentary indoor activities, such as television, video and computer games, and this has reduced the access and use of outdoors for many young children, for a number of reasons," Helen said.

"Children need to get given frequent and regular opportunities to explore and learn in the outdoor environment in order to develop healthy and active lifestyles.

"Getting outside into the fresh air offers children opportunities for physical activity and the development of gross and fine motor skills."

Research shows that very young children learn predominantly through their sensory and physical experiences, which supports brain development and the creation of neural networks.

"Contact with the natural world can offer unique experiences and they will learn to understand and respect nature and value the environment and learn how humans, animals and plants all interact," Helen said.

"Getting outside nurtures creativity and imagination, as children are challenged to come up with new games that don't involve any screen time, as well as developing and using skills such as risk assessment."

The seemingly simple act of climbing a tree actually involves a number of skills sets, including motivation (I want to climb that tree), planning (how will I tackle this?), assessing the risk and problem solving," Helen said.

"Halfway up, further navigation may be necessary, and let's not forget they need to get down.

"These play areas will inspire children while also helping them gain important skills and all the benefits of being outside."

Working with Nature Play SA

The Preschool Outdoor Learning Project supports the recent establishment of Nature Play SA and its focus on increasing outdoor play for South Australia children and encouraging families and children to prioritise outdoor play.

NaturePlay SA is an independent, not-for-profit organisation supported by the South Australian Government, established to increase the time children spend in unstructured play outdoors and in nature. Nature Play SA run workshops for schools wanting to create natural play spaces.

Nature Play SA distribute free "passports" to encourage children to get outside and active. Kids aged from three to 12 years old can access secret missions that will have them exploring, climbing, discovering, splashing, creative, swimming, rolling, riding, and enjoying being a kid outside. Their list of 51 things to do before you're 12 has proved popular with families, while 49 things to do before you're 5 is ideal for preschool-aged children.

Nature Play SA worked with Trinity Gardens Primary School and environmental landscape designer and artist Evette Sunset to create a nature play space. Teachers, students and families were engaged to help design the space.

Trinity Gardens joins a number of other DECD sites who have funded their own new nature play areas, with West Lakes Shore R-7 School and Reynella Kindergarten both opening nature play areas last week.

Reynella Kindergarten natural play area opens

A creek filled with water by an old manual pump, a sandpit surrounded by bluestone boulders, and a bridge made of jetty pylons are just some of the key features of Reynella Kindergarten's new Nature Play area, that was officially opened last week.

Children, staff and families will come together to celebrate the fruits of their labour and open the Nature Play area, which has been mostly site funded.

The Kindergarten community has worked hard to raise \$7,000 for the play area, holding raffles, selling entertainment books and even having a croissant drive.

Reynella Kindergarten Director Catherine Holdcroft said the children absolutely love their new play area.

"The creek bed is dry and the children take turns in using an old fashioned pump to fill it with water, which then runs off into little ponds in the garden," Ms Holdcroft said.

"The play area not only is fun for the children to play in, but it teaches them skills for the future.

"To use the old pump the children have to use upper body strength and coordination, which is fantastic for them to develop at this age, and the bluestone boulders placed around the sandpit offer a place for the children to hop along—this of course teaches them to assess risk and make decisions about safety, as well as use coordination and gain an understanding of momentum."
